**NARROW SERGED EDGES**

Make your own napkins and live in a greener world. They make excellent hostess gifts too. You can size them for dinner, luncheon, or cocktails and embellish them with monograms or embroidery designs. The threads and type of hem you choose can make them elegant or simply “fun”.

The range of threads to choose from is bountiful as are the styles of edges. Some of the thread choices to consider:

Serger thread (Regular)	Décor
Razzle-Dazzle	Candlelight
Variiegated King Tut Quilting Thread	Pearl Crown Rayon
Wooly Nylon	“Success” acrylic yarn

Some of the types of narrow edge serger finishes:

3-thread rolled hem	Narrow (balanced tension) hem
3-thread overlock with right needle	2-thread rolled hem
Double stitched rolled hem	2-thread wrapped overlock
3-thread lettuce rolled hem (edges of napkin must be on bias)	

If you don't want to make napkins, please bring fabric scraps and strips, as well as an assortment of threads, so that you can practice the techniques. If you do make napkins, you may choose the size and then figure the yardage needed for the number you're making. They can be single sided or double sided. I cut most of mine 14 ½-inches square, but have made larger ones as well. If they are cut 14 – 14 ½” you can get three across the width of fabric that is at least 42” after removing the selvages. You can get 12 napkins from less than 2 yds of fabric.

**In addition to your serger, manual, accessories, power cord, fabric and threads:**

- Water soluble stabilizer that can be cut into strips
- Seam sealant such as Fray Check
- Scissors or snips
- Thread nets
- Double-eyed needle
- New size 80 Universal needle or, if using Bali fabrics, a size 80 Microtex needle
- Extra fabric for testing
- Basting spray (optional)
- 1 or 2 spools of all purpose serger or sewing machine thread to match your decorative threads
